



Play & Grow groups are drop-in groups where parents with babies can build social connections while learning about a variety of topics to support healthy family development.

Play & Grow groups are offered weekly in English and in Spanish.





Family Resource Navigation services are now provided by Public Health, connecting families with services like food assistance and developmental screenings. Our Family Resource Center is operated by the Children's Museum. They host the Navigators, provide basic needs like diapers, formula, and car seats, and host family supports offerings.




Pregnancy Connections offers resources and guidance for a healthy pregnancy journey. Newborn outreach is conducted at Skagit Valley Hospital and Island Health, welcoming new babies and connecting families with community supports.

Both are universally offered services for all families in Skagit County.



Help Me Grow Skagit e-newsletters are delivered to families with developmental information and videos based on their child's age. Newsletters are available in English and Spanish and sent through the Lantern text platform. Families who sign up for Lantern receive texts with other developmental information and connection to local Skagit events.

- Increase the number of families engaging with the Lantern texting platform to receive child development information.
- Support transition report sharing between PreK and K teachers.
- Explore mobile early learning experiences.



In January, we partnered with Whatcom County to host an in-person education event for pediatric and family medical providers on behavioral health. February through June, we hosted a virtual education series on the following topics:

- Media Use
- Recognizing Child Abuse
- Collaborating with Schools
- Infant Mental Health
- Partnering with Fathers



Continued Medical Education Events

- **33** people attended our in-person event
- **51** people attended at least one virtual education event

In the Year Ahead...

- Host a virtual education series for medical providers on safety topics including safe storage for medicine and firearms, safe sleep, and bike & water safety.
- Expand newborn outreach into the prenatal clinic visits.
